Curtis Inabinet lived a life where nothing came easy. So Inabinet learned to lean on his quiet, persistent nature to get the education that would make him a leader. That meant riding his bike 17 miles to school each day. And in him grew an understanding of the simple power of showing up everyday. So when Inabinet went to work for his community as a teacher and principal, his reputation for always showing up made him the consummate fixer. It's why the voters of Ravenel elected him as the first African-American mayor and, later, sent him to Columbia to the state's House of Representatives. Ravenel got its first public water system largely because of Inabinet, who was outraged that his students, who drank from shallow, contaminated wells, were often sick. That's one of the many accomplishments of a guy who always showed up and who was always willing to fix things.
